Tucked between the flashy Strip and the rugged mountains, a serene Las Vegas neighborhood is generating new excitement. *By Andrea Bennett* 

# The juiciest steaks in town

In a city famous for glitz, Las Vegas' West Side is known for being tastefully nongaudy. But now the area—centered on the planned community of Summerlin—is getting some serious Vegas energy, much of it concentrated in the sprawling dining and shopping complex of Tivoli Village. Since opening in 2011, Tivoli has welcomed chefs Angelo Sosa, Bradley Ogden, and Sam Marvin. The last launched a Vegas rarity—

a steakhouse that locals love. At Marvin's Echo & Rig Butcher and Steakhouse, beefy choices include the bavette cut and the 2-inch-thick Spencer steak.

Nearby, Tivoli's Market LV features 15 locally owned shops. Retro B Sweet Candy

Boutique stocks Squirrel Nut Zippers, artsy River North sells chain chandeliers, and cultish Annie Creamcheese peddles vintage hats and handbags. Echo & Rig: \$\$\$; 440 S. Rampart Blvd.; echoandrig.com. The Market LV: 420 S. Rampart;

### **Power dining**

Opened by renowned restaurateur Elizabeth Blau and her husband, chef Kim Canteenwalla, industrial-glam Honev Salt draws Vegas power players. While the menu highlights elevated fare, like an heirloom tomato salad with burrata, balsamic vinegar, and bittersweet chocolate shavings, homey touches abound. The chef cooks the curry chicken using his mother's recipe and bakes the apple pie in a brown bag. \$\$\$; 1031 S. Rampart; honeysalt.com.

#### Views to thrill


Five miles west, the road from Summerlin climbs into the **Red Rock Canyon National** Conservation Area. Each year, 1 million people visit to hike the trails and marvel at the Technicolor views of the Red Rock Escarpment and Spring Mountains. Red Rock Adventures offers a gentler way into the wilderness, whisking travelers straight from the splashy lobby of Red Rock Resort into the mountains for outdoor excursions. Cap off the journey at the Spa at Red Rock, where you can work out kinks with a deep-tissue massage. Conservation Area: \$7/vehicle; blm.gov/nv. Adventures (from \$100) and spa (from \$130): 11011 W. #### **Desert dream drive**

For those who prefer to enjoy the scenery at higher speeds say, from behind the wheel of a brand-new muscle car-World Class Driving is just the ticket. Drivers can take a tutorial in the Dream Garage near the Strip, then hop into a Corvette Z06 or Shelby GI500, which goes from O to 60 in a cool four seconds.
